RIDING INTO HISTORY - "THE FAIRCHILD OAK"

First of all, let me say that this is not a safety article. Sometimes you just want to share something that you hope others will enjoy. We ride for many reasons, the thrill of simply riding a Harley, feeling the wind in our face, discovering new rides and places and so on. I often wonder about the history I'm passing through. I expect most of us have seen the Fairchild Oak located on Old Dixie Highway in Bulow Creek State Park opposite from Halifax Plantation. We pass it every time we ride on the west side of the Ormond Loop. It's one of the largest and oldest Live Oaks in Florida and is listed as an historic attraction. It stands almost 70 feet in height and more than twice as wide. It has a girth of approximately 24 feet. In short, it's a big tree, but what makes it historic? Why would they build a park around it? To answer that, let's visit the past.

James Ormond the First was a Scottish sea captain who was awarded a Spanish land grant near today's "Ormond Loop" and established a plantation he named Damietta. He was killed by a runaway slave in 1817 and his family including his son, John Ormond II, returned to Scotland. John Ormond II returned to Damietta in 1820 and he died of unknown causes in 1829. Local legend says his body was found under the great tree. He was buried at James Ormond Tomb Park located across the road adjacent to Halifax plantation.

In 1835 the Second Seminole War began. The battle concerned the Indians fighting for hunting, fishing and passage rights over what they considered their land. Despite many plantations being burned to the ground, including neighboring Bulow Plantation, the tree survived.

Norman Harwood was from a wealthy family in Minneapolis and owned a dry goods business. After losing 1.7 million dollars during an economic downswing, he left his creditors behind and came to Florida. In 1880 he purchased 4000 acres and built a two story house in a clearing near today's "Fairchild Oak". He was a huge man of great height and girth who had to stoop to enter most passage ways. The rumors of unpaid debts, cattle rustling and the like made him unpopular with his neighbors. He died in 1885 under suspicious circumstances in his house near the tree. Some felt his death was suicide as a result of his indebtedness while others hinted his past creditors may have caught up with him. His demise was featured in The New York Times. It seems he had 200 thousand dollars in life insurance equivalent to approximately 4 million dollars today. Due to the two suspicious deaths of Ormond II and Harwood taking place near the tree some people believed the area to be haunted and some even reported seeing the large apparition of a sad man walking in the area of the tree. The Harwood house persisted another 100 years and the tree there was referred to as the "Harwood Oak" or the "Haunted Oak".

In 1951a petite ball of energy by the name of Eileen Butts chaired the Florida State Parks Board. She was an amateur botanist that took on the developers to save historic sites including the "Harwood Oak". Due to her avocation she was acquainted with the most famous botanist of the era, David Fairchild. Fairchild traveled the world studying exotic plants and introducing many of them here in Florida as well as the rest of our country. He was an advisor to our government. He has been credited for bringing the famous cherry trees to Washington DC as well as figs, mangos, lemons and soy beans to Florida. Eileen Butts knew that her chances of saving the "Harwood Oak" would increase dramatically if she could change the name of the tree to "The Fairchild Oak". She made it happen.

On a side note, Fairchild's wife, Marion, was Alexander Graham Bell's daughter. Although the bronze plaque below the tree suggest that the tree may be 2000 years old, credible arborists estimate the age at 300-400 years. However, early Native American artifacts dating to 2000 BC have been discovered there.

In conclusion, I hope in the future when you pass by this mighty tree on the loop, it may make you see something more than just a big tree and add a new aspect to the joy of riding.

BIKE STUFF

Tires, who gives them a second thought? 'Stretch' is the first Triglide rider I know that replaced his back tires. During a conversation he stated that his bike handles much better with the new tires. The reason for this, as your tires wear down slowly and you think that feeling is normal. I have seen riders that do not ride very often riding on dry rotted tires. The tread might look good but the tire is not. When I inquire as to why their tires are so bad most respond with "but they only have 3 or 4 thousand miles on them. It's not the mileage but the age. I purchase my tires from a dealer. Why? They are fresh or newer. Tires purchased on line can be several years old by the time you get them. You will never know how many heat cycles they have been thru sitting in a warehouse. Case in point, my brother ordered tires for his 1971 FLH. The date code showed it was 10 years old. What difference does that make you ask? The longer it sits the harder the rubber compound becomes. The traction is reduced, and it will wear out faster. Just like produce from the grocery store you want fresh tires. I ordered tires online once and the sent me they wrong size. What a pain to return them.

Tire pressure is another interesting fact. Some riders think the PSI stated on the tire is the running pressure, *WRONG*. The correct pressure for your tire is listed in the owner's manual. Some older motorcycles have 2 pressures listed for each tire, one for solo riding and the other for 2 up. Newer M/C's have one per tire. Check your tire pressure often, it extends their life and could save yours. Several years ago, Dunlap was on strike, I needed tires when none were available. I purchased Michelin tires. I called their help line asking, "what PSI do you recommend for your tire on my bike?" Their response, whatever the owner's manual for your bike states. Yes, it was different then what was printed on the tire.

Can you play with your tire pressure? In certain circumstances, yes. In a slow race you can lower your PSI to assist you in slow speed balance. While on the Drill Team, during a performance, we would pump up our PSI to widen the footprint on the tire. This made our slow tight turns feel more stable and lean the bike over further. Most of us had on board air compressors and would correct the pressure to factory recommendations prior to riding home. A soft front tire will make your bike harder to turn. A soft rear tire, at speed, will make your bike feel like its hinged in the middle. If you have ever experienced a rear tire going flat you know what I'm talking about. Take care of your tires and they will take care of you.

Speaking of flat tires, no dealership, motorcycle or tire shop will plug a M/C tire, for liability reasons, I guess. If you are stuck in the middle of nowhere, with no cell service a tire plug kit and a mini compressor will get you home. I can tell you stories of plugging tires in the rain. Be prepared.

Hope to see everyone at PLP, only 2 more [November & December] left this year. Until then get out there and ride but please ride safe.

RIDE YOUR OWN RIDE

During a Road Captain's Pre-Ride Briefing many safety aspects of the ride may be discussed such as the destination, ride route, group riding tactics, MSF hand signals and more. Road Captains endeavor to make group rides as safe and as enjoyable as possible. It's important to listen to these instructions each time no matter how long you've been riding. Personally I feel one of the most important statements that a Road Captain makes is "RIDE YOUR OWN RIDE."

As Road Captains we've made this statement so many times that we may begin to assume that all riders know what that means. Often we have members or guests of members who are new to the group riding experience. Although Road Captains are taught to follow time tested strategies to keep the rides as safe as possible, there is no rule book that will cover every scenario we meet out there on the highway. When a lead RC makes a lane change, the sweep RC secures the lane before he brings every one over. If a rider assumes it is safe to pull over without looking, that rider may miss the individual who pulls out at the last moment from a hidden driveway or an idiot that passes the sweep over a double line at high speed. Whereas safe group riding techniques are being followed, it doesn't excuse any rider from checking their lane before executing this maneuver. Following riders turning across opposing lanes of traffic, crossing intersections or pulling out onto a highway without looking is an eventual recipe for disaster.

If a group ride seems to be beyond your comfort level, signal to those around you that you are leaving the group and then follow. "**RIDE YOUR OWN RIDE**" means that you are still responsible for <u>your own safety</u> no matter how experienced the Road Captains and fellow riders may be.



WORLD NEWS / BLOOMBERG REPORT of HARLEY-DAVIDSON® MOTORCYCLES - WINNING IN EUROPE WITHOUT A TRADE WAR

Willi Breuckmann could have gone for the BMW motorcycle—it was a comfortable and affordable machine. And it made sense for him to stick with a ride made in his own country, Germany.

Instead, he chose a Harley-Davidson. The Road King. "It comes down to a feeling," what the Germans call "ein Gefühl," said Breuckmann, a 54-year-old web developer who lives in Dortmund, in the nation's northwest.

The Road King is a big bike, <u>starting around</u> **24,000€ euros** (\$28,100 US Dollars), long and low with the iconic V-Twin engine and dual exhausts growling the sound that made Harley famous. It's a smooth ride for long trips and perfect for autobahn cruising. Over the years, Breuckmann added custom paint and a backseat for his wife. "The BMW is also very comfortable," he said. "But it was a dream of mine to get a Harley."

While U.S. President Donald Trump rails at Europeans for restricting trade and a reluctance to buy Detroit's automobiles, the Milwaukee-based manufacturer of iconic motorcycles proves every day that consumers across the Atlantic are willing to buy American. One of Harley's biggest German dealers says it sells **500** bikes a year.

The company almost doubled its market share in Germany in the past decade, to 6.4 percent in 2017 from 3.3 percent in 2006, by attracting customers like Breuckmann in Europe's biggest economy who crave the open-road American lifestyle from atop a powerful machine.

Gaining a Foothold

Harley-Davidson's market share has more than doubled in Germany since 2005, gaining up to 6.4% of all motorcycles sales. With sales in the U.S. falling, the European market has become so important to Harley that the company is willing to invoke Trump's wrath, <u>announcing a few months ago</u> it would shift manufacturing abroad to skirt retaliatory tariffs enacted in the president's trade war over steel and aluminum shipments. The European Union is imposing a <u>25% percent tariff</u> on U.S. motorcycle imports in response to Trump.

Harley's approach—catering to local European tastes with a distinctly American Harley's success in Europe is evidence that American companies can compete and even flourish there, without a trade war—if the products are good enough. The company built a strong network of dealerships and made some adjustments to the products to suit European tastes: slimmer bikes, special customization options and even wifi on board.

Europeans were introduced to Harley-Davidsons right after World War II. American soldiers rode around West Germany on big bikes with 45-cubic-inch engines (about half the size of today's models), said Christian Arnezeder, the managing director for Harley-Davidson in central Europe. Those U.S. Army motorcycles were being repurposed for civil use, models called WLA and WLC — C for Canadian.

A generation later, in 1976, the company invoked the legacy of U.S. troops and opened Harley-Davidson operations in Germany.

The bikes then were "rough rides," said Georg Kierdorf, the owner of one of **Germany's largest dealership, in Cologne, GE**. That's code for <u>unreliable</u>, the product of what for many is the low point of Harley history under the ownership of conglomerate AMF Inc., better known for bowling balls than motorcycles.

In 2005, Harley-Davidson sold fewer than 5,000 motorcycles in Europe. Current records indicate Harley-Davidson had sold better than 15 thousand motorcycles in 2016, but with newer regulations in 2017 the sales were depressed and noted to be closer to 10,000 motorcycles. New Harley products helped boost sales in 2016, while new regulations in 2017 effected some sales, a company spokesman said. Registrations used as a proxy for sales.

Harley in Europe has replicated the owner-community model that makes its brand so strong at home. Dealerships provide easy access for services, plenty of publicity, and a place to hang out and host rallies. <u>A dealership in Potsdam</u> held an event this past spring featuring <u>American tunes</u>, <u>hamburgers and hot dogs</u>.

ALL new bike owners get a free, one-year membership to the **[H.O.G.]** Harley Owners Group, the official company-sponsored club. More than **95,000** people attended this year's 115th Harley-Davidson ® anniversary meetup in Prague, Czech Republic.

"It's a European community thing," said Wolle Rider, president of the <u>H-DC German Harley Riders</u>, <u>an independent club.</u> "We're all friends."

Thorsten Knorr, president of the Harley Club Deutschland, recently set off on his Street Glide—a stripped-down version of the original Harley, all black and silver—on a 15-day, 4,500-mile journey through Scandinavia. He and five friends rode as far as North Cape in Norway, the northernmost point in Europe, and cruised through the Arctic Circle. The weather was good—except for three days of rain in Sweden. Some nights they stayed at Harley-Davidson clubs. And when one of the Harleys needed a wheel repair, they found a local dealership.

"People buy into a dream," said Knorr, 38. "They buy into a philosophy of life of freedom, of non-conformism and of owning something special." And, the Harley-Davidson Motor Company's belief is .. we are stronger than ever "IF it is sold here, IT's Made Here"
